A MESSAGE FROM: CO-CHAIRS

On December 13, 2006, the BC Games Society marked a wonderful milestone with the opening of our exhibit at the BC Sports Hall of Fame and Museum at Vancouver's BC Place Stadium. It was significant for the BC Winter and BC Summer Games because as an entity, which by nature, moves around the province, it is important for us to tell our story to those who may not reside in any of our BC Games host cities.

The BC Winter and BC Summer Games are more than four days of athletic excellence and community engagement. The Games provide an incentive for youth to become involved in sport, they challenge coaches to hone their craft, and they move thousands of volunteers toward a common goal rarely seen in a community. Further still, the BC Games become a catalyst for cooperative engagement among towns and municipalities, while pulling together the corporate and business community to invest in an event which consistently leaves a financial legacy to the growth of sport and community.

This past fiscal year saw the BC Games Society manage Games in Kamloops, Abbotsford, and Fort St. John. It was one of our "quieter years" in terms of multiplicity of Games, but these Games still involved 6,998 participants and over 5,993 volunteers. Investments made in these Games in terms of operational grants amounted to \$760,000, while an additional \$245,681 cash and \$783,122 value—in-kind was generated to ably support the work of the volunteers.

In all three communities, the BC Games Society *Guidelines for the Host Community,* a comprehensive Games management plan involving tasks, timelines, samples and software, supported the volunteers. Discussions over the past few years yielded a sale of this transfer of knowledge program to the Sport Alliance of Ontario for use at their Ontario Games. The knowledge and expertise acquired by the BC Games Society since its inception has been instrumental to our overall achievements and consistency of Games' successes.

We gratefully acknowledge and thank the Province of BC, through the Ministry of Tourism, Sport and the Arts for their continued support and confidence in the work of the Board of Directors and staff. It is equally important that we also pay tribute to the communities that continually step up to host a BC Games; it is their commitment and spirit that becomes the heart of any BC Games. We look forward to continuing on the strength of our reputation, while using our role effectively to build capacity, increase awareness in sport issues, and increase the capacity of volunteer resources across the Province of British Columbia.





host these Games in such an accessible community.



The Northern BC Winter Games and BC

This past August, the BC Seniors Games were held in Abbotsford. The 1288 volunteers hosted 2892 participants over the four days, spending \$958,000 in the local economy. This was the Fraser Valley city's third BC Games in four years In February 2007, it was Fort St. John's turn to host the Northern BC Winter Games,

having done so four previous times since

1975. 1098 participants returned to the Energetic City and were hosted by 863 volunteers. Economic impact related to Games hosting and participant spending was \$680,000. Investment of \$220,000 in the Northern BC Winter Games and BC Seniors Games resulted in direct returns to the two cities of \$1,638,000.

With scores of sport and recreation professionals in the gallery, the ribbon was cut on the BC Games Society exhibit in the BC Sports Hall of Fame and Museum. "Building Communities Celebrating the BC Winter and BC Summer Games" showcases the impact and reach the BC Winter and BC Summer Games have had on the province and the sport system since their inception in 1978.

It was former BC Premier, the Honourable William Bennett who brought the idea of a multi-sport event to BC.



By forming strategic alliances with our multi-sport Games partners, the BC Games are able to offer educational and informational opportunities.

Through Memorandums of Understanding, the BC Games Society has partnered with:

- •SportMedBC to provide education and training on sport injury and assessment, sport nutrition, and drugs and sport.
- Aboriginal Sports and Recreation Association of BC to increase awareness of opportunities for the aboriginal population, while collecting statistics related to participation rates in the BC Games.
- BC Sports Hall of Fame and Museum to showcase young athletes, coaches and officials.
- •BC Athlete Voice to ensure all athletes are aware of their rights and opportunities within the provincial sport system.

- •Coaches Association of BC to assist sport organizations teach and certify their BC Games coaches to the required NCCP level 2.
- •ProMOTION Plus to continue to ensure gender equity in policies related to athletes and coaches while collecting statistics on female participation rates.

In Kamloops, ProMOTION Plus and the CABC led a coach's forum, which was attended by 75 individuals, each leaving with a greater insight into the challenges and opportunities associated with coaching at a provincial or national level.



With Sport BC, the BC Games Society leads harassment-training workshops in each of our BC Games communities. This past year, an additional 17 officers were trained as Harassment Advisors. This figure represents 100% of all newly trained advisors over the past 12 months; a recognized and valuable legacy for the sport system of British Columbia.



The Greater Trail 2006 BC Winter Games realized a financial legacy of \$69,864. This investment will receive matching grants over the next two years, which will mean an endowment of \$139,728 will be invested in sport and recreation across the region for many years to come.

BC Games advertisements aired 155 times over two time periods to help attract young people to choose a sport and get involved, while profiling the communities readying to host. That airtime had a value of \$113,000. Global's meteorologist Mark Madrega, returned home to Kamloops to emcee the 2006 BC Summer Games.

Since 1988, Jazz has been flying athletes and coaches across BC to attend BC Games. For many athletes, their introduction to BC Games is by flying on a Jazz charter, and for BC Games staff, the province shrinks considerably as they travel on Jazz to work with the many communities hosting BC Games.
