BC Games Society Code of Conduct



The BC Games Society believes that everyone associated with the Games:

- has the right to participate in an environment that is supportive, positive, respectful, accessible, and that contributes to exceptional experiences
- has the responsibility to contribute in a positive way to the experiences of everyone involved in the Games



Exemplary conduct is expected of all Games participants (athletes, coaches, officials, adult supervisors, PSO representatives), volunteers, spectators and all individuals associated with the Games, throughout the course of their involvement with the Games.

The BC Games Society is committed to providing a sport, work, and volunteer environment in which all individuals are treated with respect and dignity. Each individual has the right to participate in the BC Games in an environment which promotes equal opportunities and prohibits discriminatory practices. The BC Games Society will not tolerate acts of harassment, abuse, bullying, hazing, or other such behaviours.

While at any Games event/function/venue prior to or at the Games, Games participants, volunteers, spectators and individuals associated with the Games are expected to refrain from the use of drugs or alcohol. All Games events/venues/functions are smoke, vape, and cannabis free.

Any behaviour contrary to the spirit of the BC Games, or any violation of any BC Games rule or policy, or in contravention of this code of conduct will result in appropriate disciplinary action. Violation of any BC Games rules by any participant may impact the continued participation of that individual in the Games and/or the inclusion of that sport in future BC Games. Everyone has rights and has responsibility - check your own actions and words; speak up for yourself and others; if you see something, tell someone.

Everyone associated with the Games:

has a responsibility to maintain and enhance the dignity and self-esteem of all BC Games participants, volunteers, and others involved with the Games by:

- Showing/giving the same respect they would want in return.
- Addressing others in a courteous and respectful manner.
- Treating others fairly within the context of their activity, regardless of gender, ethnic background, color, sexual orientation, religion, political belief, or economic status.
- Refraining from unwanted physical contact, verbal abuse and threats, unwelcome remarks including jokes, innuendo or taunting (in verbal, written or digital form) about a person's body, race, gender, attire, sexual orientation or religion.
- Refraining from public criticism of others.
- Refraining from the use of profane, insulting, harassing, or otherwise offensive language and obscene or offensive gestures.
- Respecting the privacy of others by not divulging confidential information without consent, except where required by law.
- Presenting any protest or disagreements via the correct avenue and in a respectful manner.

is expected to conduct themselves in a manner consistent with their position, to act as a positive role model and in a manner that will bring credit to the BC Games, their sport, zone and/or community, and themselves by:

- Promoting sport and community in the most constructive and positive manner possible.
- Being responsible for all of their own personal items such as identification, personal belongings, and equipment.
- Refraining from engaging in deliberate cheating which is intended to manipulate the outcome of a competition.
- Respecting and adhering to the rules and policies of the BC Games Society and as a participant, their respective sport.
- Consistently displaying high personal standards and project a favourable image of their sport, zone, community, and/or position.
- Exercising good judgement when sharing experiences on social media.
- Treating all Games and venues, properties, and equipment with respect and care.
- Not indulging in any unreasonable conduct which brings BC Games into disrepute, including but not limited to, activities which disturb or disrupt the peace, infractions of municipal, provincial or federal laws, the abusive use of alcohol, the non-medical use of drugs, tobacco, or the use of alcohol by minors, etc.
- Maintaining personal dignity in all circumstances and exercising self-control.
- Modeling sportsmanship, respect, and courtesy.

is responsible to contribute and safe environment in all aspects/areas of the Games by:

- Ensuring the safety of others and themselves.
- Abiding by the established rules.
- Refraining from unwanted contact including but not limited to, touching, pinching, kissing, sexual flirtations, advances, requests, or invitations, or physical or sexual assault.
- Refraining from use of sexist jokes, display of sexually graphic material, degrading words used to describe a person, inquiries or comments about a person's sex life or gender.
- Not using, advocating, or condoning the use of drugs or other banned substances.
- Not using technology to hurt, intimidate, embarrass, or humiliate another person.
- Not providing others with drugs and not providing those who are underage with alcohol or tobacco, vaping, or cannabis products.
- Abiding by the laws of BC and of the community(ies) in which the Games is taking place.
- Complying with rulings of the sport, host society volunteers, BC Games staff, or persons in a position of authority or responsibility.
- Not using physical force, or engaging in verbal abuse, or violent acts of any kind.

We're in this Together

There are thousands of people around the Games so there is no need to be alone. It is the BC Games Society position that:

- No one should be one-on-one in an isolated setting with a Games participant or volunteer.
- Individuals are expected to be aware of when they may be alone with another individual in an isolated setting and take action to ensure someone else can be with them or in the same room as them or within easy earshot of the discussion. If the person initiating the meeting does not invite a third person (ideally an adult) to be present then the person asked to attend the meeting should do so.
- Everyone is responsible to initiate and implement this.
 - For example, if someone needs to meet with another individual they should ask another person to be present. Ideally the other person is an adult in the same role (e.g. if a coach is meeting with an athlete they could ask another coach to be present, if a volunteer is meeting with another volunteer, they could ask a third volunteer to be present), if this is not possible, they could ask another adult (i.e. a Games volunteer at the venue could be asked to be in the room when a coach and athlete are meeting). If no other adult is available then another minor (e.g. an athlete from their zone or another zone) could be asked to be present when a coach is meeting with an athlete.

In addition to the expectations outlined for all Participants:
